It also address physical accessibility barriers for low-income Virginians. The program provides funding to local administrators to undertake physical repairs that improve housing conditions. Eligible repairs can include plumbing, structural, electrical and roofing, as well as the installation of wheelchair ramps and other accessibility modifications.</p> <p>EHARP is NOT AVAILABLE in the following communities: Cities: Alexandria, Bristol, Charlottesville, Chesapeake, Colonial Heights, Danville, Fairfax, Falls Church, Fredericksburg, Hampton, Harrisonburg, Hopewell, Lynchburg, Manassas, Manassas Park, Newport News, Norfolk, Petersburg, Portsmouth, Richmond, Roanoke, Suffolk, Virginia Beach, Winchester Counties: Arlington, Chesterfield, Fairfax, Henrico, Loudoun, Prince William. To qualify, there needs to be proof of financial aid and specific medical documentation. Preference is given to individuals in need of prosthetic treatment or adaptive technologies. Grants can also be used towards home modifications such as the installation of ramps and lifts.

The grants cover a range of expenses, including accessible-home modifications. Your grant amount depends on your financial situation, but the group says average grants are \$750 to \$1,250. To qualify, one member of the household must be employed and the main source of household income must be from employment, child support, veterans benefits or retirement.
